Funding boost supports dementia cafés in Lochs

Alzheimer Scotland Lewis and Harris are delighted to announce the launch of two new monthly Dementia Cafés in the Lochs area with funding support from the Muaitheabhal Trust.

The trust approved a grant to deliver a 12 month pilot project to increase support and contact for people with dementia and their carers and families living in and around the Lochs area.

Dementia cafés offer a 'dementia friendly' place for people with dementia, their partners, families and friends to meet up for a chat and a coffee. People who attend Dementia cafés state they find it useful to have access to helpful information or advice about any issues relating to dementia from trained staff and volunteers. Dementia cafés are on a drop in basis and there is no admission fee.

Alzheimer Scotland began fundraising to deliver community activities such as Dementia cafés in 2013 and currently run events in Stornoway, Carloway and Ness as well as supporting the Musical Memories Café in Tarbert. Community activities allow people an opportunity to reestablish community connections and remain a part of their local community.



The Islands Book Trust

It was with great sadness that we at the Islands Book Trust learned of the death of Christina J. Morrison, whose memoir, 'Yesterday's Child', we are due to publish next month. Christina was a determined, courageous lady with a great love of life, and a talented writer who was very much looking forward to seeing her first book in print. Our sympathies go to her family and friends in Inverness, Skye and Lewis.

Christina, the middle child in a family of ten, was brought up in Innes Street, Inverness, in the 1930s. It was a happy and lively household; her father was a Pipe Major of the British Legion, her brothers were pipers and Christina and her sisters were dancers.

Christina had many fond memories of holidays spent at her maternal grandparent's home at 19 Gravir, some of which she relates in this book. Christina joined the Auxiliary Training Corps just before the outbreak of World War II.



Once war was declared, Christina was instructed to go to London, where she discovered that she would be working for Intelligence Services at Whitehall, decoding top secret messages for the government. Christina frequently deciphered messages headed 'For Mr Churchill's Eyes Only', some of which related to events which, in hindsight, proved to be of great historical significance.

Christina's tales of her adventures in wartime London (including meeting Winston Churchill in his pyjamas!) are a fascinating first-hand account of a by-gone era, retold with modesty and humour.

Realising the opportunities

Next steps for Pairc Trust

Now that the immediate euphoria of finally purchasing Pairc Estate has receded, Pairc Trust want to push ahead quickly - with the input and help of everyone in the community - to draw up and then successfully implement plans to improve the quality of life in Pairc.

This is a huge opportunity, and we need your involvement so that we can properly reflect the wishes and priorities of the whole of the community. As I said in the last newsletter, we wish to be as open as possible and will develop plans for priority projects in full consultation with other local groups and local crofters and residents. Here are the next steps we plan:

*Appointment of new staff - the job adverts placed before Christmas for new full-time Development Manager and Administrative Officer posts have attracted a lot of interest. We are currently sifting through the applications and arranging interviews, and we will make the appointments as soon as possible. The new staff will initially work from the Pairc Trust's office in the Resource Centre, Kershader - although in the longer term we plan to use office space incorporated into the Pairc Hall Committee's plans for a new community hall between Kershader and Garyvard if the resources can be attracted to implement this



- * Firm up arrangements for crofting business discussion are at an advanced stage with solicitors Anderson MacArthur to provide legal support to Pairc Trust in carrying out our new responsibilities as crofting landlord. This will ensure continuity and expertise while our Directors and staff build up our own experience and skills in the administration of crofting business.
- * Appointment of new Directors a date for the next AGM of Pairc Trust will be announced in the next few weeks, together with arrangements for the nomination of new Directors. All current Directors of the Trust will stand down at the AGM. While some of the current Directors intend to stand for re-election, we would greatly welcome others in the community putting their names forward whatever your background, age, and experience. We particularly need younger people and more women to make the Board more representative of the community as a whole. Do please give this your serious consideration. As I said at the public meeting held on 14th December, now is the time for new blood and fresh thinking if we are to make the most of the opportunities for Pairc.

*Consultation on priority projects – once our new Development Manager is in place, we plan a series of consultation meetings during the first half of 2016 with other community organisations and through open meetings to get ideas, receive feedback, and decide on priorities for the next two years, and – in less detail – the longer term. This will include consideration of improved community facilities, housing, renewable energy projects, and initiatives to attract more visitors to the area – with a positive spin-off to Ravenspoint and other parts of the local economy.

We already have a draft business plan as a starting point, but this needs revisiting, updating, and amending in the light of the views of others. It will be necessary to seek additional funding from sources such as the Big Lottery Fund to take forward the priority projects. Our overall aim, in line with the community plan, is to create more local jobs and improve the quality of life for people of all ages in the community.

We will keep our members and all local residents informed of progress through regular updates in the Muaitheabhal community newsletter, through an improved Pairc Trust website, and by other communications. This is a great opportunity for everyone in Pairc – please help us to turn aspirations into reality.
