# PAIRC AND KINLOCH

## Background

The Community Plan has been created to articulate the priorities of the Pairc and Kinloch Community. Pairc and Kinloch is a locality to the South East of the Isle of Lewis within the civil parish of Lochs. It is lightly populated, supporting a community of 939 spread over 23 villages.

## Baseline and progress

In order to chart progress against a Plan, it is important to know the starting point from which a comparison can be made. In this community, the demographic start point is a total population figure of 939; a working age population which is 1% lower than the rest of the Outer Hebrides, a pensionable age population that is 2% higher and proportion of children 1% higher. The demographic trend over the last century has been one of population decline, falling birth rates and an increasing proportion of older people, a pattern which is replicated across the Outer Hebrides as a whole. On a positive, note the number of females in employment has risen and the number of young people has increased which gives hope for the future. Additional detail on the demographics of the area has been collated and a direct comparison will be made against these figures as the Plan progresses.

A mapping exercise has been carried out to establish the number of community groups operating in the area and their individual needs and aspirations. At present there are approximately 20 groups actively working towards development and growth of their organisation. This mapping allows community groups to identify shared goals, possible sharing of resources and even potential amalgamation, thereby boosting the efforts of groups and their members.

## Communication

As the Plan progresses MCWFT will keep a record of any new or improved activities that have been delivered and which contribute towards the aims and objectives.

MCWFT will endeavour to keep the community and stakeholders engaged and informed.

Methods used will include:

- MCWFT open meetings
- LDO regularly engaging with groups
- Regular reports to Highlands and Islands Enterprise and other agencies
- Press releases and social media
- A final Report in 2020

# VISION FOR PAIRC AND KINLOCH

The Vision statement captures 5 specific aims which work together to focus and drive the development of the area.

*“Pairc and Kinloch is working towards being a viable, vibrant and demographically balanced community. It will be an accessible, well serviced community that is sustainable for the future needs of the area and its residents”*



## COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT PLAN

This Plan has been developed by the Pairc and Kinloch Community and sets out a vision for the area in 2020 and how it aims to drive forward positive change for the benefit of residents and visitors alike.

The Pairc and Kinloch Community entered into a Community Account Managed (CAM) relationship with Highlands and Islands Enterprise (HIE) in 2015. This means that HIE recognises the Plan as articulating the Community's priorities and HIE will provide support to implement the Plan, working through MCWFT as 'anchor' organisation. Muaitheabhal Community Wind Farm Trust (MCWFT) has led the process of preparing the Plan, in close consultation with the community, and will monitor and report on progress against it. MCWFT has been allocated an account manager within HIE to support the process.

As further contribution towards implementation of the Plan, MCWFT and HIE have jointly funded a Local Development Officer (LDO) post to support the various groups represented in the Plan. The post holder took up position in April 2015 and can be contacted through MCWFT.

This Plan has taken a previous Plan into consideration and the priorities have been updated through further consultation with community organisations, members of the community, and stakeholders. Over the next five years, through working in partnership with all involved, the Community Plan will build on what has been achieved so far and will be the guiding document for development of the area.

## The Anchor Organisation

Muaitheabhal Community Wind Farm Trust (MCWFT) was established as a charitable community trust in 2010 to distribute the community benefit from a proposed wind farm in Eishken. To date just over £3 million has been received by the Trust to be spent on community development opportunities which meet the charitable purposes of the Trust. Under a pre-planning agreement with the land owner and the Comhairle, up to 30% of monies received will be paid to the Western Isles Development Trust to help support charitable causes throughout the Western Isles.

The Trust is managed by a board of 10 Trustees from the local community. The significant investment received has the potential to have a transformational effect on the communities involved (which include Pairc, Kinloch and villages in North Harris). This opportunity has created the need for a community plan to map the direction the community want to go and to inform future activity.

MCWFT is working closely with HIE in order to support the Pairc and Kinloch area to implement the Plan. The Trust and HIE have identified some key 'priority projects' for the LDO to provide intensive support to help bring projects to fruition. Other projects will also be identified as the Plan progresses and LDO and MCWFT support will be given to these.

Although community groups will be eligible for support from the LDO, all funding applications to the Trust will be treated equally and will be scored according to merit.

## Gaelic and Culture

The Pairc and Kinloch Area has one of the highest proportions of Gaelic speakers and learners in Scotland, with 54.7%, or 487 people, that have the ability to speak the language.

Since the introduction of the Gaelic Language (Scot) Act 2010, Gaelic has become an official language of Scotland. Recent research estimates that the economic value of Gaelic as an asset to the Scottish Economy could be in the region of £81 million (Ar Storas Gàidhlig - Highlands and Islands Enterprise 2014). As a Gaelic speaking area, Pairc and Kinloch has the opportunity to utilise this valuable asset within the community to the benefit of the community and the Gaelic language.

## Crofting, Land, and Community

As with many of Scotland's communities, the people of Pairc and Kinloch have a strong attachment to the land around them. There is an active crofting community with a number of young people also participating in this traditional sector. Crofting is recognised as not only

important to the local economy but also for retaining the population of an area. (Shucksmith Report 2008). The Pairc and Kinloch community seeks to actively support crofting, as well as other traditional industries such as weaving and fishing.

The desire for community land ownership is also strong to have better control and influence over their future.. Aline forestry was acquired in 2005, Pairc Estate was transferred into community ownership in late 2015 and active steps are being taken to purchase the Keose Glebe Estate.

## Connectivity

Good connectivity is vital to the sustainability of every community. In Pairc and Kinloch, both the physical and digital connectivity of the area offers varying degrees of challenge. The need to retain connections, such as transport and road infrastructure, are important for a physical connection for members of the community and initiatives such as community transport will play a role in this.

The Scottish Government and HIE have identified digital connectivity as a priority for development, with a £146million project actively developing broadband services within the Highlands and Islands. Parts of the Pairc and Kinloch community are still facing limited broadband services and while some areas are to be covered in the current programme some areas will not be served leaving a digital divide. For mobile phone services the Pairc area is badly served with no coverage from any provider in Gravir, Lemreway, Orinsay and Calbost. To progress the provision of enhanced developments for both broadband and mobile the community needs to engage with agencies to ensure that equality of services is delivered timeously.

## Housing

Housing demand and a variation in housing accommodation (eg rental, house sites, crofts, social housing) within the community has been raised as a priority area. Not only does housing provide a home for those living in the area, but it provides an opportunity for community investment and income generation. Agencies are interested in working with the community to establish need within the area. MCWFT are going to conduct a survey within the community to determine requirement and the possibility of adding to the housing stock of the area.

## Services – Education, Mobile Services and Support

A well serviced community can mean many things to many people. Services which are used by many within Pairc and Kinloch include health, education, support, and social. The need for the retention of health services has been raised, with services in the area being maintained through the Langabhat Medical Centre and the local surgery in Gravir. In addition to this, there is out of hours doctor provision, a first responders group, and the Home Care service which all works together for the benefit of the community.

Comhairle nan Eilean Siar operates two Primary schools for residents of Pairc and Kinloch - Sgoil na Pairc, Sgoil nan Loch – and the Secondary School in Stornoway - the Nicolson Institute. Pairc Playgroup is a community run nursery covering pre-school provision for Pairc. Pairc Playgroup are working towards a new enhanced provision of services with the Creag Mhòr / Pairc Community Hub project to look into ways to sustain and develop current provision and facilities.

Education covers more than purely formal education. There are also courses and training on a wide range of subjects being investigated, including crofting skills training with Lochs Agricultural Society, as well as Gaelic classes and digital skills training which are available through Ravenspoint.

Similar to education, mobile and support services covers a huge range of features within the area. From the mobile bank and library, to the support groups which come to the area. MCWFT, Community Representatives (including the Community Councils and Councillors), and Community Organisations will continue to support and lobby for the retention and reasoned development of provision within the area.

## The Aims - Breaking it down

The aims of the Community Plan are the long term purpose. In order to realise these aims, each has been broken down into 5 objectives. These objectives give specific purpose and direction for each of the aims and provides a basis for analysis. As the projects table shows, all of the objectives are included in various ways.
